

**Welcome to The Studio**, our new self-directed maker space for all ages. Open since January, The Studio is located on the First Floor in the former Technology Center. The Studio is your space to DIY, pick up a new hobby, and collaborate on projects using our creative equipment and tools.

**In The Studio, you can:**

- Design 3D prints to replace a missing part of a household item
- Stitch monograms on garments using our embroidery machine
- Create stickers with our Silhouette Cameo machine & software
- Transfer designs onto a T-shirt with our heat press
- Laminate important documents & more!

**How it works:**

Drop in to The Studio; no appointment needed:

- Monday-Friday: 1pm-8pm
- Saturday: 10am-4pm
- Sunday: 1pm-4pm

The equipment is free to use and available on a first come, first served basis! Choose two free supplies per week, Monday through Sunday, to use for in-house projects. Studio staff will be on hand to answer questions, troubleshoot equipment, and connect you with learning resources.
