A Look Back at 2023

This winter, we'll be sharing our 2023 Year in Review report with the Wilmette community. You'll find highlights from our building, events, and staff; an overview of the year in numbers; and lots of smiling faces. The report will be available online and in print at the library. Stay tuned!

A snapshot of our year in numbers:

- Total circulation was 856,912, an increase of 8% over 2022
- More than 80% of Wilmette households have at least one library card, and more than 67% of library cards have been used to check out physical materials in the past 6 months
- The library had 215,069 visitors, a 37% increase over 2022
- The library offered 1,029 programs (up 65% over 2022), with 26,663 attendees (up 200% over 2022)
- Use of digital resources is up 13% over 2022






How does it work?


